The **Lyman Estate Greenhouses** are among the oldest surviving greenhouses in the United States. The complex includes an 1804 grape house, 1820 camellia house, 1840s orchid house, and a 1930 sales greenhouse where you can buy plants to take home. Their expert horticultural staff offers advice and assistance with plant selection and culture.

The **Roger Williams Park Botanical Center** is located on an island in historic Roger Williams Park in Providence, RI. The Botanical Center was built in 2007 and with 23,000 square feet of greenhouse space, it is the largest indoor garden display in New England that shows off plant life in its myriad forms, from delicate flowers to spiky cacti to pest-eating carnivorous species.
