These gardens are the work of John Fallon, who has nearly single-handedly worked this plot since 2016. All of the many types of vegetables grown there are donated to local agencies who serve people suffering from food insecurity. This year's harvest totaled over 6,000 pounds of organic produce, and is particularly welcome now by those in need.

For oft, when on my couch I lie In vacant or in pensive mood, They flash upon that inward eye Which is the bliss of solitude; And then my heart with pleasure fills, And dances with the daffodils.
