Native Plants vs. Invasive Species Thursday, November 14th 7:30PM Suzanne Mahler

Massachusetts Invasive The Plant Advisory Group (MIPAG) defines invasive plants as "non-native species that have spread into native or minimally managed plant systems in Massachusetts. These plants cause economic or environmental developing self-sustaining bv populations and becoming dominant and/or disruptive to those systems". Suzanne Mahler's presentation provide images of hardy native plants and common local intrusive aliens along with suggestions for eradicating some of these problematic invasive species.
